Archway Programs – New Jersey

Introduction

This case study of Archway Programs is based on a June 2016 survey of Crisis Prevention Institute customers by TechValidate, a 3rd-party research service.

Results

- Reduced challenging/disruptive behaviors by 40-49% since implementing CPI de-escalation techniques.
- Decreased the use of physical restraint and seclusion by 75-99% since implementing CPI training.
- Achieved return on investment with CPI by:
 - Meeting regulatory compliance
 - **Reducing injuries**
 - Reducing worker compensation claims
 - Reducing liability
 - Improving staff skills and confidence
